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
History of Rogales

Nogales is derived from the word for "black walnuts" in Spanish, referring to the trees that once grew in the mountain pass between Nogales, AZ and its sister city Nogales in Mexico. At over 3800' in elevation, Nogales does have mountain passes.

Thousands of years ago, Nogales was on a migratory and trade route used by native American tribes. This was later named "El Camino Real" (the royal trail), and would be used by the conquistadors in their quest for gold and gems. Nogales was at the beginning of the Juan Bautista de Anza Expedition in 1775-6, an expedition to create an overland trail to the San Francisco area, dotted with missions. The town became part of the United States in 1853, as a result of the Gadsden Purchase.


The name Nogales did not really come into general use until later. When the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railway arrived in 1882, and was connected to the Sonora Railway system, there was a rail link created stretching from Guaymas, Mexico to Kansas City, MO. In 1883, the Wells Fargo Stagecoach Co established a presence in Nogales, further strengthening international commerce with a shipping and transport service. A post office was also established, and the location now became known as Nogales.

The history of the area dates back to the civilizations of the Hohokam, Yaqui, and Apache people, who built settlements along the rivers and streams in the area. There were often confrontations and raids, especially between the Apache and white settlers. The army had a presence in Nogales, but when the Civil War broke out, the army presence was greatly reduced, which led to more Apache raids, a long-term situation dubbed "Cochise's War". The Mexican Revolution of 1910, which went on for 10 years, also kept Nogales in the center of things, with battles involving Pancho Villa, General Pershing, and General Obregon taking place in the area.



Both Nogales now concentrate on trade and tourism, so take the time to visit; you won't regret it.
