ISTORY OF THE CITY OF MARIO

Father Eusebio Kino, in 1694, made a journal entry describing a place that would become Maricopa Wells. He described it as an established agricultural community, populated by friendly Native Americans, who were also accomplished traders. It was an oasis, with 4 of Arizona's rivers converging here.

In the 1800's, when everything south of the Gila River was Mexico, Maricopa Wells was a dependable source of water along the Gila Trail, as well as of food supplied by the local Native American farmers. The Butterfield Overland Mail Line, which ran from St Louis to San Francisco, used Maricopa Wells as an important stage stop.

In the 1870's, when Phoenix was just getting started, the Southern Pacific Railroad established a route just south of Maricopa Wells connecting Tucson and Yuma. The small community moved to be next to the line, which became Maricopaville. A second line was to be built to the west of South Mountain into Phoenix. This did not happen, but the town was moved 3 miles to the east (today's Maricopa), and a spur was established to Tempe (good lobbying!). That spur today lies underneath John Wayne Highway (Maricopa Road).

Rail traffic to Phoenix on the spur was discontinued in 1935. This compelled the local farmers and pecan growers to become more efficient; these operations became more mechanized, to allow the produce to sell well even without the Phoenix spur. A strong agricultural foundation had always been at the core of the community's existence, and until the early 21st century, it was mainly a farming area.

In the early 2000's, builders and homeowners alike saw the potential in this area, and the race was on. Maricopa skyrocketed in population. The recent economic downturn has affected Maricopa, and many homes have turned over. Homes are attractively priced, and finding ready buyers, so the future looks bright.
