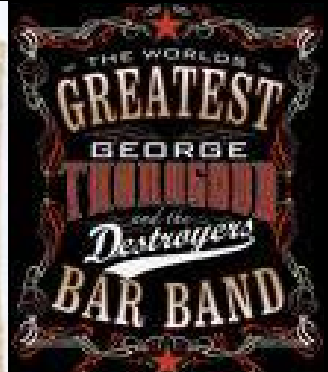
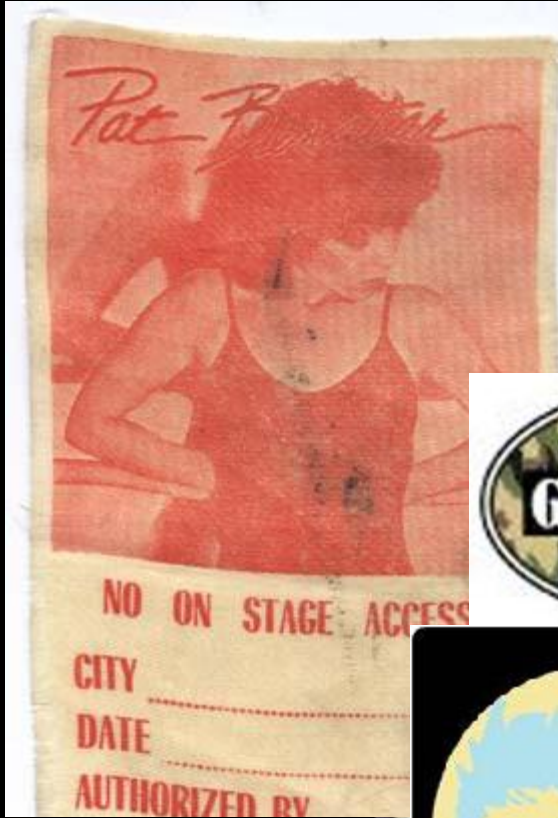

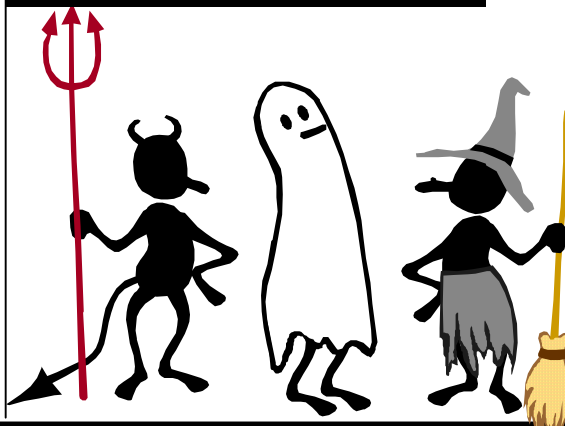

Still staring down, the drunk replied, "I don't know but I think I just beat the crap out of a ghost!"

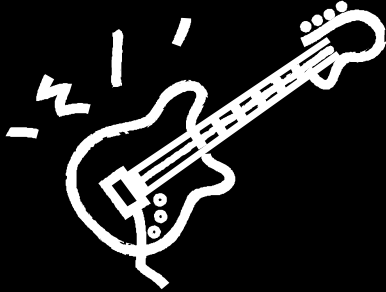

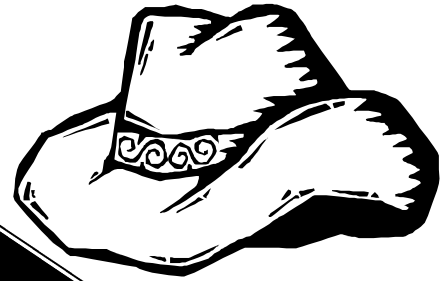

dash ground cloves

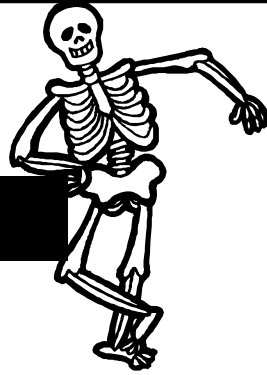
dash ground nutmeg

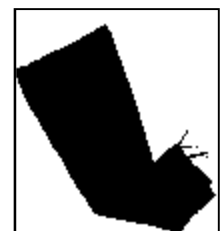

I'm thinking about going back to Girlfriend 7.0, but the uninstall doesn't work on Wife 1.0.

Dear Troubled User:

This is a very common problem that men often complain about.

Many people upgrade from Girlfriend 7.0 to Wife 1.0, thinking that it is just a Utilities and Entertainment program. Wife 1.0 is an OPERATING SYSTEM and is designed by its Creator to run EVERYTHING!!!

It is also impossible to delete Wife 1.0 and to return to Girlfriend 7.0.

It is impossible to uninstall, or purge, the program files from the system once installed.

You cannot go back to Girlfriend 7.0 because Wife 1.0 is designed to not allow this. Look in your Wife 1.0 manual under Warnings: Alimony-Child Support. I recommend that you keep Wife 1.0 and work on improving the situation. I suggest installing the background application Yes Dear 2.7 to alleviate your program problems.

The best course of action is to enter the command C:\APOLOGIZE! because ultimately you will have to give the APOLOGIZE command before the system will return to normal anyway.

Wife 1.0 is a great program, but it tends to be very high maintenance! Wife 1.0 does come with several support programs, such as Clean and Sweep 3.0, Cook It 1.5, and Do Bills 4.2

However, be very careful how you use these programs. Improper use will cause the system to launch the program Nag Nag 9.5 Once this happens, the only way to improve the performance of Wife 1.0 is to purchase additional software.

I recommend Flowers 2.1 and Diamonds 5.0.

WARNING!!! DO NOT, under any circumstances, install Secretary With Short Skirt 3.3 . This application is not supported by Wife.

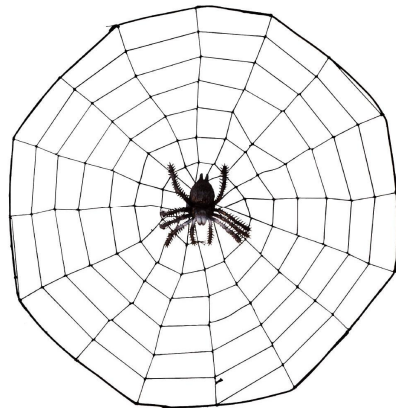
and have two children; Billy Jr. and Kyri. I currently live in Apache Junction, and will be relocating to Phoenix within the year.

This is the month of our Anniversary. For some of us old timers that can still remember 1993, and the tough times we endured, it is hard to believe that we got to where we are. Jeff Swanson and Taz can surely confirm some of the stories of those days. I can tell you that Karen Foley worked 2 full time jobs, one for Mill Avenue Merchants and full time with T.E.A.M. , so that I could still pay my bills and focus full time on getting the company of the ground. It may have been tough times, but it was also the best of times. Many good memories. These were the days when we still regularly had large fights on weekends on Mill Avenue, with thousands of kids just hanging out. Brickyards was not there, Long Wongs was where there is now a big empty space next to Jack in the Box. The Gin Blossoms were a just recently discovered national phenomenon that made the wings and beer joint famous for playing there on a regular basis, as did many other bands. The Marriot hotel was a dirt lot. McDuffy's and Club 411 were the happening places, as was Edcel's Attic. There was a new place getting ready to open up called Gibson's where Margarita Rock's now is. They made the Boogie Knights a huge weekly event. Tempe Beach park was just another city park with a pool that was no longer used and had become a hangout for all the trolls. East 6th Street was an actual street, not just a turnaround, The Valley Arts Theater played "the Rocky Horror Picture Show", and the freaks all showed up in costume and the place was packed. Where the Brickyards are now, there was a crappy little biker bar called 6th East (even though it was ion 7th Street) that was always good for a

few good fights at bar close. The building where the Library Bar and Hooters now are was an abandoned building. Fat Tuesday and Palapa's at Centerpoint and Balboa at Hayden Square were the happening drinking holes. Mill Avenue was a live music scene. Harry Mitchell, now a federal representative for Arizona was the mayor of Tempe. We had parking attendants on Centerpoint. That was it. Our first event was the Tempe Sister City Oktoberfest, which back then was at Hayden Square.

We dreamed some day becoming good enough to work at America West Arena (Now USAC), BOB - Bank One Ballpark (Now Chase Field, even though it was not built back then, but we knew we wanted to work there) and Desert Sky Pavilion (Now Cricket Wireless Pavilion) Dodge Theatre was not built yet. I look back with pride and warmth at the "good old days", but with a clear understanding that the best is still ahead of us. Over the past 14 years, well over 10,000 people have been employed with us. Many left a mark, many are much missed. Some have moved on to local, state and Federal law enforcement. I am very proud of them. Every once in a while I get a call or email from somebody who worked here a long time ago, and they tell me how working here changed their life, or how it helped them grow up and be responsible. That is the greatest compliment. There are many people that are responsible for the success of this company. It never has been about me. It has always been because of the dedication and hard work of so many. We sometimes say that someone bleeds black and white because they care so much. That is so very true at times. If it was not for those moments and those people, I do not know how we could have gotten here.

Tempe has always been our home, the place where we started, and the source of much of our growth. We recently were awarded the security contract with the City of Tempe, and we are now officially the primary security provider for the City of Tempe. I am very proud of this, and honestly feel that it was because of many years of hard work that we earned it. We have to remember though, that we have to earn it over each and every day we go to work. The same applies for all of our business. We will continue to be successful, as long as we care and pay attention to doing the best we can. About 10 years ago, I was invited to have lunch with one of our clients. I was terrified, because he had never asked me to have lunch, and I was afraid he was going to fire us. I don't want to mention his name, because we still work for him Jon Bloom, but we actually had a nice lunch, and obviously he did not fire us. I asked him, once I knew we still worked for him, what we could do to provide him with a better service. He responded without a moments hesitation that complacency is our biggest enemy, and that we needed to watch for that more than anything else. I have never forgotten his Jon Bloom words, and want to remind all of you of how important that is. It does not matter how many times you have worked a post, how many times you have been at the same venue, how many times you greeted the same guests - You never know what will come next, or what can happen. Being alert and remembering that you are always on condition yellow could make all the difference. Never take anything for granted, and NEVER assume that something was ok because it was the hour, day or week before. We live in a different world, in a world where what we do can make all the difference.

Along these lines, last month a true hero died. He never got the recognition he deserved, and his passing went mostly unnoticed. His name was Richard Jewell. During the 1984 Olympics in Atlanta he was working for a good friend of mine. It was Richard Jewell who discovered a suspicious package at one of the events, and began clearing out the crowd from the area. His actions saved the lives of countless people. The FBI in it's infinite wisdom accused him of planting the device to get attention and fame for himself. Even though the real Olympic bomber was eventually caught and convicted, and the FBI looked like a poor imitation of the Keystone Kops. Jewell was offered an apology, but he never got what he deserved - The gratitude and thanks of his country. He moved on with life, became a cop eventually, and died too young. In 1984 people just assumed that all security guards were just people hired off the street, or someone who was not good enough to become a cop. Times have changed, and Richard Jewell did a lot to bring about a new perception. Many people say 9/11 was the event that changed our role. I say it was Richard Jewell. May he rest in Peace.

There are no jobs more noble, more selfless than being a protector. Be it a soldier, a police officer, a fireman, or even paramedic or a security guard, we all protect the helpless and the weak. No cop or marine do what they do for the money or the glory. They do what they do because of a core belief in preserving the good, eliminating evil, and keeping those that need it most safe. There is no "hero" who does what he does for the money. In the military, the highest honor that can be bestowed on a soldier is the medal of honor. All 4 branches of the military have it. It is the Medal of Honor. Most are awarded posthumously (After the recipient has

died) So many are awarded posthumously because that soldier had performed an act so courageous and so dangerous that it cost his own life. He gave his life to protect others. NO soldier does what he does hoping to earn the Medal of Honor. But a recipient of the Medal of Honor gets more respect than even a Commanding General. No police officer goes to work because there is a million dollar bonus for the cop who catches the most bad guys. Every soldier, every firefighter, every cop is willing to make the ultimate sacrifice every day they go to work. They do it for people they do not know, for people who do not care and for people who rarely will appreciate them for what they do. No sports star, no movie actor and no other character that we idolize or worship is willing to make that kind of sacrifice. To most athletes, doing something that might cost them money is a sacrifice. To the Hollywood elite, going somewhere that they do not have the cameras following them is a sacrifice. For a NBA basketball player, minimum wage is a million dollars a year. They have God's gift of height as their greatest asset. A soldier or a police officer has a family sitting at home, worrying if their hero will return home. A Soldier's family often cannot afford to buy groceries. An athlete will have his followers wondering what new garment they can buy to shove more money into their "heros" pockets. Most importantly, after having served their country or their community, a soldier, a fireman and a police officer will still have the same moral values that guided them in their careers, and are willing and able to be a hero again whenever they need to be, and an athlete when he hangs up his shoes and jersey?
