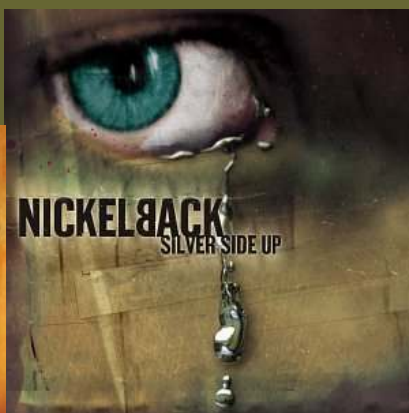

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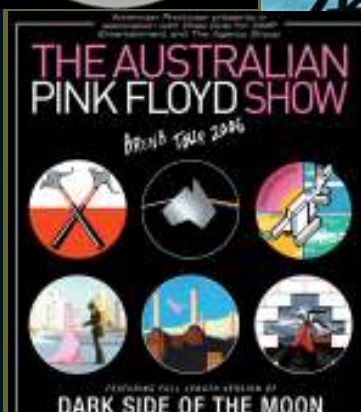

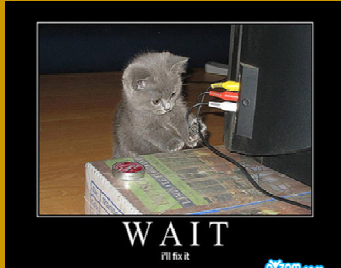


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Meow, Meow, Meow....Right Meow!....by Ashleigh Gaylord

First, try and not to taunt the clown all of the time. When they are in the attic they tend to sleep a lot.

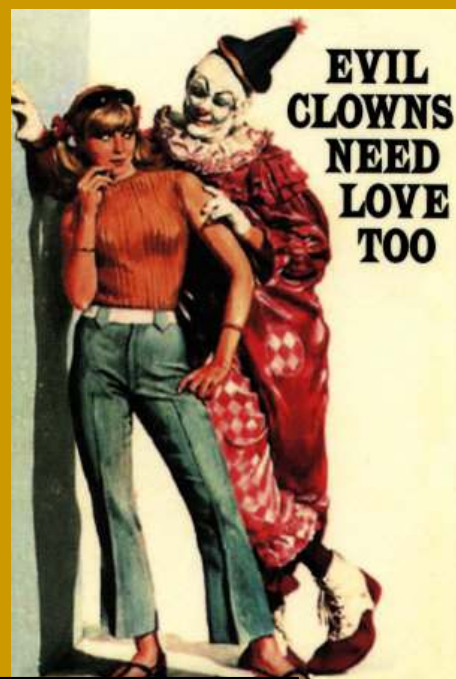
These species are named Lalaipis. If you are good enough, you could train the clown and make it your servant.

Poor planning on your part is an emergency on my part because.....???

How Not To NC/NS by Travis Roy

When it comes to scheduling and being scheduled it is important to remember where to look and look consistently up to the start of your shift for days and hours are subject to change. These days of regular scheduling are given out after your weekly call-in and then TEAM will call back (DON'T ASK IN THE OFFICE). DO ASK about classes for training and take all that you can when you can. All shifts/hours/info should be written down (if not printed out, for those that apply) and then worked. There are mandatory shifts also called BLACKOUTS, that means no matter what everyone works at least one shift (a shift being a minimum of 4 hours). For any shift you should come prepared! Once assigned you are responsible for that shift and for letting TEAM know of any changes or cancellations within the appropriate time-line given within your orientation packet and handbook, which goes as follows:

if you NO CALL/NO SHOW you voluntarily resign your position with TEAM, there are no exceptions

if you DO NOT CALL IN to scheduling for 2 consecutive weeks you voluntarily resign your position with TEAM

if you DO NOT INFORM TEAM management of a change in your profile (ie: phone #) you voluntarily resign

if you are LATE 2 TIMES IN 6 MO you will be suspended, if it persists termination

if you CALL TO CANCEL your shift WITHOUT giving 12 HRS NOTICE, you may be suspended or terminated

6.if your calling off AFTER YOUR SHIFT STARTS does NOT count as a notification and will result in termination

7. VACATION time has specific paperwork that you can pick up at the office or out of your Report

Writing packet and MUST have at least 2 weeks notice.

DON'T FORGET to keep up and check constantly on your schedule and the company's schedule BY:

ALSO—CHECK YOUR VOICEMAILS!

Non-computer access:

TAKE schedulers call, write down shift, location, parking, needs, or any other information you might need.

LOOK on the Calender at TEAMS OFFICE, Mon-Fri 10am-6pm

Grab the monthly paper copy of TEAM CENTS newsletter located at the office.

Pay attention to attachments or notes on your checks or other paperwork given out by TEAM

Computer access:

Printed up schedule and directions (if apply)

Calender of events and training on the TEAM WEBSITE

EMAILED TEAM CENTS newsletter from TEAM.

On this Day, Once Upon a Time by Frank Herbert

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

October 1, 1908 - Henry Ford's Model T, a "universal car" designed for the masses, went on sale for the first time.

October 2 - Indian political and spiritual leader Mahatma Gandhi was born. He was assassinated by a religious fanatic in New Delhi on January 30, 1948.



October 3, 1863 - President Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation designating the last Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day.

October 4, 1582 - The Gregorian Calendar took effect in Catholic countries as Pope Gregory XIII issued a decree stating the day following Thursday, October 4, 1582, would be Friday, October 15, 1582, correcting a 10-day error accumulated by the Julian Calendar.

October 5, 1986 - Former U.S. Marine Eugene Hasenfus was captured after a plane carrying arms for the Contras was shot down over Nicaragua. This marked the beginning of the "Iran-Contra" controversy.

October 6, 1927 - The first "talkie" opened in New York. *The Jazz Singer* starring Al Jolson was the first full-length feature film using spoken dialogue.

October 7, 1765 - The Stamp Act Congress convened in New York City to protest to the British Stamp Act which imposed the first direct tax by the British Crown upon the American colonies.

October 8, 1918 - During World War I in the Argonne Forest in France, U.S. Sergeant Alvin C. York single-handedly took out a German machine-gun battalion, killing over a dozen and capturing 132.



Birthday - John Lennon (1940-1980) was born in Liverpool, England. He was murdered in New York City on December 8, 1980.

October 10, 1973 - Spiro T. Agnew (1918-1996) resigned the office of Vice President of the United States amid charges of income tax evasion on illegal payments allegedly received while he was governor of Maryland and after he became Vice President.

October 11, 1939 - Albert Einstein warned President Franklin D. Roosevelt that his theories could lead to Nazi Germany's development of an atomic bomb. Einstein suggested the U.S. develop its own bomb. This resulted in the top secret "Manhattan Project."

October 12, 1960 - During a debate over colonialism in the United Nations, Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev took off his shoe and pounded his

desk repeatedly.

October 13, 1775 - The United States Navy was born after the Second Continental Congress authorized the acquisition of a fleet of ships.

October 14, 1912 - Former President Theodore Roosevelt was shot by a fanatic while campaigning in Milwaukee. Although wounded, he insisted on making the speech with the bullet lodged in his chest and did not go to the hospital until the meeting ended.



October 15, 1991 - The U.S. Senate confirmed Clarence Thomas to the Supreme Court by a 52-48 vote following several days of tumultuous hearings before the Senate Judiciary Committee. Thomas became the second African American to sit on the Court, replacing retired Justice Thurgood Marshall, an African American.

October 16, 1916 - The first birth control clinic in America was opened in Brooklyn, New York, by Margaret Sanger, a nurse who worked among the poor on the Lower East Side of New York City.

October 17-25, 1944 - The Battle of Leyte Gulf, the largest naval battle in history, took place off the Philippine Islands, during World War II in the Pacific. The battle involved 216 U.S. warships and 64 Japanese ships and resulted in the destruction of the Japanese Navy including the Japanese Battleship *Musashi*, one of the largest ever built.

October 18, 1945 - The Nuremberg War Crimes Trial began with indictments against 24 former Nazi leaders including Hermann Göring and Albert Speer.



October 19, 1781 - As their band played *The World Turned Upside Down*, the British Army marched out in formation and surrendered to the Americans at Yorktown. The war between Britain and its American colonies was effectively ended.



October 20, 1944 - During World War II in the Pacific, General Douglas MacArthur set foot on Philippine soil for the first time since his escape in 1942, fulfilling

his promise, "I shall return."

October 21, 1879 - Thomas Edison successfully tested an electric incandescent lamp with a carbonized filament at his laboratory in Menlo Park, New Jersey, keeping it lit for over 13



hours.

October 22, 1979 - The exiled Shah of Iran arrived in the United States for medical treatment. A few weeks later, Iranian militants seized the U.S. Embassy in Tehran and took 66 Americans hostage. They demanded the return of the Shah for trial. The U.S. refused. The Shah died of cancer in July of 1980. The hostages were freed in January of 1981.



October 23, 1983 - Terrorists drove a truck loaded with TNT into the U.S. and French headquarters in Beirut, Lebanon, exploding it and killing 241 U.S. Marines and 58 French paratroopers.

October 24, 1929 - "Black Thursday" occurred in the New York Stock Exchange as nearly 13 million shares were sold in panic selling.

October 25, 1854 - During the Crimean War, the Charge of the Light Brigade occurred as Lord Cardigan led the British cavalry against the Russians at Balaclava. The Charge was later immortalized by Alfred Lord Tennyson.

October 26, 1881 - The shoot-out at the O.K. Corral in Tombstone, Arizona, occurred between the feuding Clanton and Earp families. Wyatt Earp, two of his brothers and "Doc" Holliday gunned down two Clantons and two others.



October 27, 1787 - The first of 85 Federalist Papers appeared in print in a New York City newspaper. The essays argued for the adoption of the new U.S. Constitution. They were written by Alexander Hamilton, James Madison and John Jay.

October 28, 1886 - The Statue of Liberty was dedicated in New York Harbor. The pedestal contains the words: "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, the wretched refuse of your teeming shore. Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door!"

October 29 - Nazi propaganda minister Paul Joseph Goebbels (1897-1945) was born in near Dusseldorf, Germany. Devoted to Hitler until the end, he died at Hitler's Berlin bunker in 1945 after poisoning his six children.

October 30 - John Adams (1735-1826) the 2nd U.S. President was born in Braintree, Massachusetts. He had been George Washington's vice president, and was the father of John Quincy Adams, the 6th President.

October 31, 1941 - Mount Rushmore National Memorial was completed after 14 years of work.

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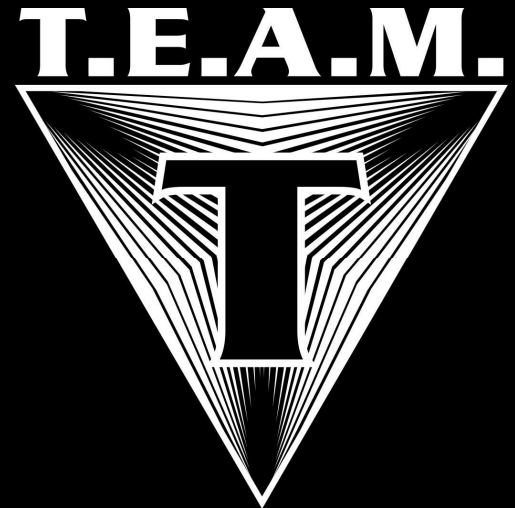
